What is EDI?

- Equality, Diversity and Inclusion
- Commitment to these principles
- **Liberation groups:** Groups that face oppression and marginalisation by wider society
- **Access groups:** Groups that face barriers with accessing and participating in higher education e.g. university

Why EDI?

- Equality Act (2010) - It's a legal requirement!
- 71% of students fit into a liberation or access category
- You are responsible for a society and student leaders - you have influence over the general culture of your peer group

Liberation Societies

Liberation Societies are groups of students who are typically disadvantaged within society.

Current Liberation Societies include:

- Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) Society
- LGBTQ+ Society
- Womens' Society
- Disabled students*

These Societies may receive some extra support due to their varying needs .

Our Equality and Diversity Officer committee role

- **The role:**
 - Championing EDI and being a point of contact for society members
- **Expectations from us:**
 - Listen, open minded
 - Signpost to resources e.g. Report and Support
 - Flag issues and concerns to the Societies Team
- No longer a core role, now an additional role – EDI is a shared responsibility amongst all committee members.



Accessible Events SU Policy (1)

- Passed in November 2023
- Lasts until November 2026
- In 2023, there were 8000 Disabled students at Hallam

Carers, Commuters and Parents

- Location of your event - May not be on city or collegiate campus often
- Alcohol based events – Driving to and from
- Online events instead
- Childcare arrangements

Neurodiversity

- Noise – quiet spaces, music volume
- Lighting
- Small vs large groups
- Structure – conversation, activities

What should you consider ...

Physically disability

- Access to toilets
- Ramp accessibility

Religion, faith and language

- Consider the dates and times
- Food options
- Overnight trips – prayer spaces

Gender and sexual orientation

- Biases
- Asking for and using pronouns
